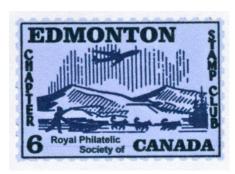

Maps on Stamps

With the advent of GPS maps built into our smartphones, the need for physical maps and a copilot (code name for "wife") to read those maps while driving, has largely disappeared. Even so, most of us who belong to this grand club grew up with those physical maps, and I suspect, also enjoyed scanning them for all their juicy details.

Like my grandson, who even today enjoys drawing maps at the age of six, I also remember drawing maps as a child. For me they became a picture of a place I had never been to. Later, it would become a safe way to travel to places in the world I would never risk going to. As I got older, the map became more limited to practical matters like determining the best route from point A to point B.

It is with this in mind that I began to think about maps that have been pictured on stamps. Apparently, this is actually a specialized area within the hobby, known as "Cartophilately." To illustrate the passion that some people have for this subsection of our hobby I draw your attention to a man by the name of Allan Lee.

For thirty-four years he researched this topic of maps on stamps and in 1977 donated to the Smithsonian Institute his life's work in twenty-six volumes. His collection included some 7500 examples of mainly accurate maps, but also some showing the inaccuracy of maps on stamps. A more detailed article on his collection

These maps on stamps offer us numerous insights. Allow me to mention just a couple. They can sometimes help us see the growth or changes in a country, like this set below from Canada illustrating the evolution of our country.









Some map stamps show us the darker times in human history when dictators and foreign armies overwhelmed nations.

Colnect currently lists over 21,000 stamps in this thematic category. If you had asked me how many map stamps Canada had I would never have guessed that there were actually 227 stamps connected to this theme. I'll leave you with some Canadian and Newfoundland samples.

A First in First Day Covers

I will start out by saying that I am not a First Day Cover collector. This does not mean that I do not have First Day Covers in my collection. If someone gives me a First Day Cover I will certainly thank them and give it a home in my collection. Generally speaking, I do not buy them. They take up more space than a stamp, and my collection has outgrown the shelf I put them on. Also, they are more expensive than stamps and I already spend way too much on stamps and the supplies that one needs to collect them.

This USA First Day Cover is the only one I have ever purchased. It is not an expensive cover, but it has a lot going for it in the interest department. It celebrates Canada's centennial. The cachet is a picture of Canada's Fathers of Confederation. (I will assume it is a real picture of the Fathers of Confederation even though there were a couple of 1897 Newfoundland stamps that were printed in the USA that were not what they purported to be.) Unfortunately, the picture does not include Joey Smallwood, because Newfoundland joined Canada in 1949. (Nowadays we could just morph him into the picture.)

The most interesting thing about this First Day Cover is that it is the first US stamp to have first day ceremonies and cancellation on foreign soil - in Montreal. Canada. This is not a rare or expensive First Day Cover. However, like most things philatelic, it shows that you don't have to bankrupt yourself to have something interesting in your collection.


